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General Description of fonds

William Moodie Bell (1777-1837). Naval shipwright and farmer.

William Moodie Bell (1777-1837) was the son of John Bell and his wife Ann, née Stenhouse. He was born on 9 January and baptized on 12 January 1777 in the parish of Aberdour, near Kirkcaldy in Fifeshire, Scotland. He entered the employ of the Provincial Marine as a naval shipwright and began his career at Amherstburg, Upper Canada, in June 1799. There he designed and built vessels for the Great Lakes service. Many of these were lost in 1813 at the Battle of Lake Erie, after which he was evacuated from Amherstburg, at the time of the retreat from the Western District, and served thereafter at the Kingston dockyard. The Admiralty's appointment of Thomas Strickland as Master Builder in Upper Canada displaced Bell from that position, but in 1814 he was appointed as Strickland's assistant. Upon Strickland's death in 1815, Bell became Acting Master Builder in Upper Canada until the end of 1816, when the establishment at Kingston was reduced and Bell returned to Scotland.

Having succeeded in obtaining a government pension, Bell returned to Canada, where he seems to have considered going into partnership with his brother John Bell (1779-1841) and a French Canadian shipbuilder, François Romain, at Quebec, before settling down as a farmer at Little River, Lower Canada.

By his first wife, Ruth Devonport, he had at least one daughter, Elizabeth, who married James Cullen. His second wife, Jessie Inglis, bore him four sons, of whom John, the eldest, became a farmer at Amherstburg, where his father had acquired property during his years as Master Builder there. William Bell died and was buried at Quebec, 9 September 1837.

A small collection of Bell's correspondence was acquired in 1937. Some additions to the correspondence, which are asterisked in the list of descriptions for file 1 provided in the finding aid, were acquired in 1938, together with Bell's Letterbook, 1800-1838. In July 1987, Bell's memorial of 10 June 1818 (file 1, page 96) was found to be missing, and Dr. W.A.B. Douglas of the Directorate of History in the Department of National Defence, Ottawa, Ontario, kindly supplied a photocopy of his notes taken previously from the original. Two returns of provisions, 1772, which were with the correspondence acquired in 1938, appear to have no connection with Bell.

Two provision returns, 8 and 11 June 1772, for men of the 60th and 8th Regiments respectively (File 1, pp. 1-4). No connection between these documents and William Bell is apparent.

Letters, petitions, etc., of William Bell (1777-1837). Included are:

letters to Bell, and a few copies of letters from him, relating to his work as a naval shipwright in Upper Canada; his personal financial arrangements; his purchases of land; his efforts to obtain a pension and compensation for his war losses; certificates relating to those losses; the management of his lands in Upper Canada by his agent in Amherstburg; a sketch and specifications for vessels to be built by Bell; accounts; and a few more personal items; as well as a shop license for Lachlan McDonell of Cornwall whose connection with Bell is obscure (File 1, pp. 5-127).

Letterbook, n.d., 1804-1836, 1838. (Original, 0.05 m.)

Copies of letters, certificates, etc., written or received by William Bell (1777-1837), and one letter written by his son John Bell. In addition to the same topics dealt with in the papers in File 1, there is correspondence relating to William Bell's legal disputes with his brother John Bell (1779-1841) of Quebec; to the payment of his pension; to his business with his brother-in-law, David Inglis of Dunfermline, Scotland, from whom he annually ordered clothes, farming equipment, etc.; his opposition to the marriage of his daughter Elizabeth; and the education in Scotland of his eldest son, John (File 2, pp. 1-255). The arrangement of the letterbook, in so far as it can be said to have an arrangement, is topical rather than chronological, and the reader is recommended to make use of the listing in Finding Aid 1721, which integrates the entries in the letterbook with the loose papers in File 1 in a single chronological sequence.
