

McGILLIVRAY OF GLENGARRY

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Fraser: Hopper, and McIntyre, (Vols. 10-12)

Catherine, sister of Isabella McGillivray married into the Fraser family, while another sister, Jane, married George Hopper. The connection between the Frasers, Hoppers and McGillivrays remained close. The connection with the McIntyre family has not been established.

## Fraser, 1800-1868 (vol. 10)

Includes grant to Thomas Fraser, 1800 (pp. 1-2); two letters and accounts by Alexander Fraser (fur trader), 1820-1834 (pp. 6-15) and two letters to Hon. Alex. Fraser, 1834-1839 (pp. 16-19); estate of Archibald Fraser, 1859-1868 (pp. 22-103 and bound volume); a few papers of William Fraser, an interpreter under Sir William Johnson, who became Sheriff of the District of Johnstown in 1803, and of William N. Fraser (pp. 104-121).

## McIntyre, John, 1784-c.1812

Discharge, 1784 (pp. 122-123); commission, 1788 and 1812 (pp. 123-126); roll of his militia company, 1812 (pp. 127-130); certificate that Alex. Grant & D. McKenzie have taken the oaths, 1787 (pp. 131-132); list of those who paid for the burial ground, 1802 (pp. 133-134); letter to directing the provision of transport for flour, c.1812 (p. 135).

## Hopper, George, 1810-1812

Journal and commonplace book, 1810-1812. Hopper was wounded in the Peninsula campaign and was a prisoner of the French.

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Records of the 89th Regiment, 1809-1823 (vol. 11)

Apparently preserved by George Hopper. On reverse cover, it reads "No. 7 Company, description Book" but his refers only to a few pages each with a few entries.

Entry Book kept by Alexander Fraser as commander of the Glengarry Highlanders, 1838-1839. (vol. 12).

Neil John McGillivray, 1853-1894 (vol. 13).

Papers relating to the estate of McGillivray of Dummaglass which Neil John inherited in 1856, as well as some family correspondence.

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
