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INTRODUCTION

This finding aid provides listings of the papers accumulated by members of the Ruiter (Ruyter) family, 1776-1867. The inventory entry provides a general description of the collection. A detailed description of individual documents within the collection is available in this finding aid. Within each file the documents have been arranged chronologically.

Henry Ruitter (or, Hendrick Ruyter, 1742?-1819) and his brother John (Johannes) Ruitter (1740?-1797) were Loyalists from the Genesee Valley, N.Y. Henry Ruitter settled first at Caldwell's Manor, and in 1799 on a grant in Potton Township. John Ruitter settled on Missisquoi Bay, where he acted as agent of Thomas Dunn, seigneur of St. Armand. Philip Ruitter (1766?-1820) succeeded his father, John, as agent for Thomas Dunn. At his death, Dr. Calvin May assumed the management of the estate for C.R. Cheeseman, the heir.

The finding aid No. 135 provides an index to the authors of the correspondence in volume 1 and a descriptive list of the documents in volumes 2 and 3.

Field book of Amos Lay kept during his survey of lots in Philipsburg, 1809 at the bequest of Philip Ruitter (volume 13; 45 pages). Presented in 1921 by W. Jones of Bedford, Que.
