

DUGUID, ARCHER FORTESQUE, 1920, 1933-1941. 6 inches.

Colonel A. F. Duguid, O.B.E., D.S.O. (1887- ) was born in Bourtie, Aberdeenshire, Scotland and educated at Fettes College, Edinburgh and McGill University, Montreal (B.Sc. 1912). He served in the Great War from 1914-1918. In 1921 he became Director of the Historical Section of the Department of National Defence, which position he held until 1947. During this latter period he also compiled material for and wrote volume 1, History of the Canadian Forces in the Great War in 1914-1919.

The Duguid Papers were given to the Army Historical section and later presented to the Archives. They consist largely of reports relating to the demobilization of the C.E.F. in 1919, and articles, some written by Duguid, pertaining to military matters. A tabular listing furnishes a detailed guide.
