Roald Amundsen, Norwegian explorer, was born in 1872. Following his South Polar expedition of 1910-1912 and the Great War, he undertook a North Polar expedition on board the "Maud" in 1918. He did not succeed in his attempt at drifting from the North Siberian Islands across the Pole, but later attained his objective by dirigible. He perished in 1928 while on an Arctic flight.
