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CANADIAN FOOD AND ALLIED WORKERS (est.1943), National Office.

In 1939 the Packinghouse Workers Organizing Committee of the Congress of Industrial Organizations began organizing workers in Canadian meat processing plants. Until then labour union organization in Canadian packing plants had been isolated and relatively unsuccessful. The Canadian Committee, first under the direction of Charles H. Millard and later Fred Dowling, established new locals in large Toronto and Vancouver meat processing firms and re-organized plants in other centres that had been affiliated to the American Federation of Labour, the Trades and Labor Congress and the All-Canadian Congress of Labour. In 1943 the United Packinghouse Workers of America was formed and Canada became a major portion of District 10 of the Union. Fred Dowling was elected its first Director. In 1946-47 the U.P.W.A. established the principle of company-wide collective bargaining with Swift Canadian, Burns, and Canada Packers, the three largest meat processing firms in Canada. Subsequently, the Union expanded its jurisdiction into other food processing industries and related fields such as flour and feed mills, fruit and vegetable canneries, sugar refineries and leather processing firms. In 1958, Canada became the sole territory of a newly-organized District 8 and in 1961 the union's name was changed to the United Packinghouse, Food and Allied Workers to reflect the changing nature of its membership. In 1953 the U.P.W.A. and their strongest rival, the Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workmen (A.F.L.-C.I.O.), had signed a no-raiding agreement and a merger of the two organizations was almost completed in 1956. Finally, in 1968, the amalgamation was successfully achieved. Although the American section of the new union was called the Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workmen, the Canadian section became the Canadian Food and Allied Workers.
