BOVEY, WILFRID, 1916-1919. 2 feet.

The noted Canadian educator, Wilfrid Bovey (1882-1956), was born in Montreal, Quebec, and educated at Abingdon School, Montreal, McGill University (B.A. 1903) and Cambridge University where he received an LL.B. In 1907 he was called to the Quebec Bar. During the Great War he served with the Elack Watch and at Army Corps Headquarters, his rank being Lieutenant-Colonel. Between 1919 and 1923 he practised law in Montreal, publishing Life Insurance Law in 1922. From 1923 until 1946 he was Director of Extra-mural Relations and Extension at McGill University. During this period he also served as Chairman of the Canadian Legion Educational Service (1939-1946). He was appointed to the Legislative Council of Quebec in 1942. In 1918 he was awarded the O.B.E. and in 1935 was made an officer of the Légion d'Honneur.

The Bovey Papers relate solely to military matters, having been accumulated during Bovey's period of service overseas in the Great War. A detailed finding aid furnishes a guide to the reports, memoranda, notes, and maps. The Bovey Papers were given to the Army Historical Section in —— and later presented to the Archives.
