Jonas JONES and family

Jonas Jones (1791-1848) was a member of the Family Compact, related by marriage to several prominent officials of Upper Canada. His brother Charles Jones (see MG 24, B 7) was a member of the Legislative Assembly and the Legislative Council. Another brother, Alpheus Jones (see MG 24, B 98) was Collector of Customs at Prescott. Jonas Jones was a member of the Commission on the division of customs duties between Upper and Lower Canada, 1821, and of the Commission of inquiry into the government departments, 1839 (see Rg 5, B 35). He was a judge of the District Courts of Bathurst, Midland and Johnstown districts and the Surrogate Court of Bathurst and Johnstown districts, 1822-27, before appointment to the Court of Queen's Bench, on which he served 1837-48. In 1843 he was named to the Executive Council as a judge of the Court of Appeal. He also served on the quasi-judicial Heir and Devisee Commission, 1841-48. From 1816 to 1828 and again 1836-41 he sat in the Legislative Assembly of Upper Canada, and served as Speaker, pro tem, of the Legislative Council, 1839 (a position generally held by the Chief Justice of the Court of Queen's Bench). He married May Elizabeth Ford, daughter of David Ford of Morristown, N. Y., and by her had a large family.

David Ford Jones (1818-1887) was the son of Jonas Jones. He engaged in manufacturing at Gananoque and served in the Legislative Assembly, 1864-67, and the House of Commons, 1874-82. He had several sons, among whom were Jonas (b. 1853) and Ford (b. 1870)

The papers of Jonas and David Ford Jones were presented in 1974 by Mr. H.W. Hawke on behalf of the Jones family of Gananoque. Information about the family is to be found in E.M. Chadwick's ONTARIAN FAMILIES (vol. 1)
