MITCHELL, CHARLES HAMILTON, 1914-1920. 11 feet, 4 inches.

Brigadier-General C. H. Mitchell, C.B., C.M.G., D.S.O., LL.D., C.E., (1872-1941) was born at Petrolia, Ontario and educated at the University of Toronto (B.A.Sc. 1894, C.E. 1898). For a number of years he practised as a civil engineer, devoting himself particularly to the field of hydro-electric power development in which he became a recognized expert. In July, 1919 he was appointed Dean of the Faculty of Applied Science and Engineering at the University of Toronto.

Mitchell's military career was equally illustrious. He was successively
Lieutenant in the Militia; Major in the Corps of Guides and Divisional Intelligence Officer on General Staff, 2nd Division, Toronto, 1911-14; Lieutenant-Colonel, General Staff Officer (Intelligence), 1st Canadian Division, Valcartier,
England, France, and Belgium, 1914-1915; General Staff Officer (Intelligence),
Canadian Army Corps (General Byng), France, 1915-1916; General Staff Officer,
(Intelligence), 2nd Imperial Army (General Plumer), 1916-1917; and General
Headquarters British Army in Italy (Lord Cavan), 1917-1918; Brigadier-General
(Intelligence), War Office, London, 1919.

In recognition of his distinguished service he received the following honours and decorations: (mentioned in despatches seven times)

The papers are grouped in three series: Western Front, Italian and Eastern Fronts, Personal papers. Those relating to the two theatres of war are arranged alphabetically by type, e.g., reports, and subject, eg., communications, and while this arrangement gives rise to a certain amount of overlapping, the placement in type categories of only those items which are not clearly encompassed by the subject files has kept overlap to a minimum. Thus, for example, a "report on operations" will be found under "operations" rather then under "reports".

Most of the papers are concerned with military intelligence and originated with the intelligence corps; however, only those bearing specifically on enemy activities or the means by which information on enemy activities was gained are to be found under "Intelligence", those concerned with allied activities being placed in the appropriate subject or type category outside "Intelligence".

An attempt has been made to fit Intelligence papers to the section responsible for their creation, in accordance with furnished functional charts and descriptions outlining the competencies of each division. As the organization of intelligence on the Western Front differed from that on the Italian Front, the respective arrangements assume slightly different forms.

The Personal Papers relate essentially to Mitchell's private life in so far as that can be distinguished from his military career which is all-pervading. They, like the papers in the other two series are arranged alphabetically by type and subject.

Some 525 photographs relating to the two-fronts have been transferred to the Picture Division.

Presented to the Army Historical Section in 1942 by Brigadier-General Mitchell's estate, and later transferred to the Public Archives.
