John Neilson (1775-1848) emigrated from Scotland in 1790 to join his brother Samuel Neilson (1771-1793), who had succeeded their uncle William Brown (1738-1789) as proprietor of the QUEBEC GAZETTE. John Neilson succeeded as proprietor on his coming of age in 1797. He gradually assumed a number of public offices and responsibilities, including membership in the Legislative Assembly of Lower Canada, 1818-1834 and 1841-1844, and a seat on the Legislative Council, 1844-1848. He was an active Reformer, in association with Louis-Joseph Papineau and Denis-Benjamin Viger, until 1834, and was a delegate to London in 1822 and 1828 with other Reformers and in 1835 on behalf of the Lower Canada Constitutional Association.

Some transcripts were made in 1908 from correspondence then in the possession of Col. Hubert Neilson of Cap Rouge (volumes 32-33). The bulk of the collection was acquired in 1911. Further transcriptions were made in 1924 (volume 15) and some additional items were acquired in 1971-1972 and 1976 (volume 192).

Finding Aid 119 provides a comprehensive summary of the collection (part 1), as well as chronologically and alphabetically arranged lists (parts 2 and 3) for the correspondence in volumes 1-16, 18, 20, 32 and 35-38. Portions of the collection had been calendared at the time of their acquisition and the calendar was printed in the Public Archives REPORT for 1913, Appendix G and 1918, Appendix D. Those listings and the index of correspondence in volume 34 no longer relate to the present arrangement of the collection. The introduction to Finding Aid 119 provides a categorical summary of the family and business records, as well as a microfilm shelf list.

The complete collection is being microfilmed as a protective measure. Limited conservation treatment was carried out in 1981-1982, as a result of which several unlisted items came to light and were provided with coverage in the finding aid (see volume 192). RESEARCHERS ARE REQUESTED TO USE THE MICROFILM.

NEILSON COLLECTION (Cont'd)

The Neilson Collection is a composite of material relating to John Neilson Sr., his family, contemporaries and associates; to the firm of Brown and Gilmore (printers) and to the QUEBEC GAZETTE. In addition, John Louis Hubert Neilson, a grandson, had historical interests which led him to acquire documents, many of which became intermingled with the family papers. As a result, the contents of volumes is difficult to categorize; neither dates nor type of document nor subjects provide accurate clues to the sequence of volumes. The material can be described within four basic series but volume titles must not be considered as exclusive definitions of their contents.

SERIES I: John Neilson and family, 1666-1912. Originals, 2.89 m; photocopies, 6 cm; transcriptions, 13 cm (volumes 1-20, 23-26, 28-45).

Business, political and personal correspondence of John Neilson, his wife Marie Neilson and sons John Neilson jr., and Samuel Neilson jr.; Laura Moorhead (Mrs. John jr.) Neilson, Mrs. John Moorhead and Marguerite Moorhead. Included among the correspondents are Francois-Xavier Garneau, Robert Christie, Louis-Joseph Papineau, Denis-Benjamin Viger, John Bennett and William Gowan. Some correspondence on particular subjects is to be found in other sub-series, notably the estate and business records. (Originals, 1.83 m; photocopies, 6 cm; transcriptions, 13 cm; volumes 1-12, 14-15, 18, 20, 28, 32-33, 35-38, 40, 42-45.)

Correspondence, memoranda, returns and notes, accumulated by John Neilson sr. and Dominique Mondelet during their Commission of Inquiry into penitentiary systems, 1834-1835 (under the act 3 William IV, c. 10). (Originals, 3 cm; volume 13.)

Estate records relating to seigniories and other properties owned by the Neilson family, including accounts, deeds and mortgages, lawsuits, inventories and some correspondence, 1666-1854. The

correspondence overlaps business letters found in Series I, II and III. (Originals, 53 cm; volumes 16, 25, 29-31, 39 and 41).

Subject files, formed of correspondence and a wide variety of documents relating to education, Indians, political affairs, agriculture and social welfare (volumes 17, 23-24 and 26); an obsolete index of correspondence (volume 34); notebooks and journals and personal account books of John Neilson (volume 19) and a poll book of Quebec County, 1827 (volume 39A). Originals, 50 cm.)

Series II: Brown & Gilmore, printers, 1763-1861. Originals, 3.76 m; photocopies, 2 cm (volumes 47-156).

Correspondence and accounts of William Dunlop, a Philadelphia printer to whom William Brown had been apprenticed, 1763-1768 (photostats, volume 47); letterbook kept by the executors of the estate of William Brown, 1789-1790 (volume 47); ledgers, journals, cash books, shipping books and other business records of William Brown and Thomas Gilmore (volumes 48-156). (volumes 50 and 125 are available on reel C-13100 and volumes 126-156 on reels C-15676 to C-15679.)

Series III: QUEBEC GAZETTE, 1768-1845. Originals, 3.06 m (Volumes 46, 157-190). Also available on microfilm (reels C-15611 to C-15617.)

Subscription books of the QUEBEC GAZETTE, 1768-1803 (volume 46), including one for Staff Surgeon Walter Henry's book "Trifles from My Portfolio," 1839-1841; letters to the editor and correspondence relating to accounts, orders and subscriptions, 1793-1846 (volumes 157-182); accounts and orders, 1792-1835 (volumes 183-190). The GAZETTE itself is found in RG 4, D 1, but researchers must use the microfilm at the National Library.

The correspondence appears to have been separated from the official records and subsequently to have been acquired by John Louis Hubert Neilson. The Admiralty Lake Service records are described in RG 8, III A.

Documents collected by George M. Fairchild relating to the history of Valcartier, of which John Neilson was an original proprietor (Volume 191; 5 cm). The papers include letters of John Neilson, documents relating to settlement of the area, and three letters to G. M. Fairchild, with a few newspaper clippings and notes. Presented by Miss C. N. Fairchild of Bergerville, Quebec.

Addenda: items dated 1813-1913, acquired since 1971 or previously unlisted (Volume 192, 15 cm). Details of provenance are noted in the finding aid.

John Neilson (1775-1848) quitta l'Ecosse en 1790 pour joindre son frère Samuel Neilson (1771-1793) qui avait succédé à son oncle William Brown (1738-1789) comme propriétaire de la Gazette de Québec. En 1797, John Neilson devint, à son tour, propriétaire du journal. Par la suite, il assuma un certain nombre de charges publiques: il fut membre de l'Assemblée législative du Bas-Canada, de 1818 à 1834 et de 1841 à 1844, conseiller législatif de 1844 à 1848. Il fut un réformiste actif, et fut travaillant avec Louis-Joseph Papineau et Denis-Benjamin Viger jusqu'en 1834, et fut délégué à Londres en 1822 et 1828 en compagnie d'autres réformistes et en 1835, au nom de l'Association constitutionnelle du Bas-Canada.

Des transcriptions furent effectuées, en 1908, à partir de correspondance alors en possession du Colonel Hubert Neilson de Cap Rouge (volumes 32-33). L'acquisition de l'ensemble de la collection date de 1911. D'autres transcriptions furent exécutées en 1924 (volume 15) et du matériel supplémentaire fut acquis en 1971-1972 et en 1976 (volume 192).

L'instrument de recherche no 119 donne un aperçu général de la collection (partie 1) et contient des listes chronologiques et alphabétiques (parties 2 et 3) de la correspondance classées dans les volumes 1-16, 18, 20, 32 et 35-38. Des parties de la collection ont été décrites au moment de leur acquisition et publiées dans le Rapport des Archives publiques de 1913, Appendice G, et dans celui de 1918, Appendice D. Ces listes ainsi que l'index de la correspondance du volume 34 n'ont aucun rapport avec le classement actuel de la collection. L'introduction de l'instrument de recherche donne une liste des archives de famille et d'affaires regroupées sous la forme de catégories, ainsi qu'un répertoire numérique du microfilm.

La collection entière est présentement en cours de microfilmage afin de la protéger. Des traitements limités de conservation ont été exécutés en 1981-1982 ce qui eut comme résultats de mettre à jour des pièces qui avaient échappé au premier classement et qui sont maintenant décrites dans l'instrument de recherche (voir volume 192).
LES CHERCHEURS SONT PRIÉS D'UTILISER LE MICROFILM.

La collection Neilson se compose de documents concernant John Neilson senior, sa famille, ses contemporains et ses associés; l'entreprise de Brown et Gilmore (imprimeurs) et la Gazette de Québec. De plus, comme John Louis Hubert Neilson, un petit-fils, avait un intérêt pour l'histoire qui l'a conduit à faire l'acquisition de documents, plusieurs de ceux-ci sont maintenant entremêlés avec les papiers de famille, ce qui a comme conséquence qu'il est difficile de définir le contenu exact des volumes. Ni les dates ni la nature des documents ni les sujets ne fournissent des indications sur l'ordre des volumes. Le matériel peut être décrit en quatre séries de base mais les titres de volume ne doivent pas être considérés comme les définitions exclusives de leur contenu.

INTRODUCTION

Notes on the History and Arrangement of the CollectionProvenance

The bulk of the collection was acquired in 1911. Extracts from the sale catalogue are to be found pasted within some volumes and onto certain documents (eg: volume 192, file 5). Volume 191 was acquired about 1923 but not shelved until about 1970. Volume 192 was created in 1982 to hold items which were found in series I-IV but unlisted, together with a number of items acquired in 1971-1972 and 1976 which had been temporarily shelved in volumes 43 and 45. Further notes are provided in the detailed listings of those items and volumes.

The historical interests of John Louis Hubert Neilson may serve to explain the presence of some materials, while the senior John Neilson's public offices may provide justification for the inclusion of other apparently unrelated documents. Acting as agent, trustee or executor for others, John Neilson and his sons may have accumulated the variety of documents which now are found with the Neilson family and business records.

Arrangement

The order of the documents within the collection is somewhat idiosyncratic. The inventory entry provides a summary description under such general headings as correspondence, accounts, estate records and subject files. The microfilm shelf list (see pages xxii onward) presents the short titles of the volumes in numerical sequence. A categorical summary (see page xxi) provides guidance to those volumes having a very mixed content.

The correspondence in Series I is in no particular order, although family letters are generally separated from business, political and legal letters. Parts 2 and 3 of this finding aid provide listings

of that correspondence (volumes 1-16, 18, 20, 32 and 35-38) in chronological sequence and alphabetically by author. There is, however, further correspondence to be found amongst the business, legal and estate records. The business correspondence in Series II and III is generally arranged by author, then chronologically.

Description

The degree of detail offered in Finding Aid 119 varies significantly, from a ten-page listing for the contents of a single volume to a one-page summary of titles for ten volumes. The levels of description may vary not only between volumes but also within volumes: contents of one file may be itemized while contents of the next are summarized.

Much of the business records as well as the estate records remain without an explanation of arrangement and contents. The volume titles (particularly in Series I) serve to indicate the nature of the majority of the contents. Correspondence may include accounts and other enclosures. Estate records such as wills, inventories, deeds and leases may be accompanied by correspondence. Where the letters have been arranged alphabetically by author, the listing may indicate only their outside dates and the page range in which they are found.

Portions of the collection were calendared at the time of their acquisition, the calendars being printed in the REPORTS of the Public Archives. Appendix G, pages 99-151, of the 1913 REPORT provides a calendar of John Neilson's public correspondence, 1801-1824. Appendix D, pages 473-559 of the 1918 REPORT provides a calendar for the public correspondence of 1824-1847. Both calendars have since been superseded by the descriptions found in parts 2 and 3 of this finding aid. There is no correlation between those calendars and the present arrangement of the correspondence.

Description (cont'd)

Revision of the finding aid has been limited to the provision of introductory and explanatory notes and the systematization of volume titles. The term 'miscellaneous' was replaced with more specific terms of description. More extensive amendment was not feasible; many volumes remain described only in the most general terms. The identification of the account books is an area of particular concern. The researcher is therefore advised to proceed cautiously. THE DESCRIPTION OFFERS ONLY A GENERAL GUIDE and should by no means be considered a definitive identification of any or all parts of the collection.

Conservation

In preparation for microfilming of the collection, the documents were reviewed and those demonstrating evidence of deterioration or fragility were repaired. The bindings of certain volumes of bound correspondence were dismantled, since the method of binding was determined to be the cause of damage to the individual documents. Where possible, the original binding of journals, account books and the like was preserved. With the exception of items transferred to volume 192, the integrity of the original volume numbering was maintained.

Microfilm

Filming began in 1980 and will be completed by 1983. The relevant parts of the finding aid have been filmed with the volumes. On completion of the work, a revised microfilm shelf list will be added to the finding aid and that guide will be filmed for the benefit of researchers using the inter-library loan arrangement. As a protective measure, the collection will be withdrawn from circulation. RESEARCHERS ARE ASKED TO USE THE MICROFILM rather than the originals. Xerox copying is damaging and must be avoided. Reader-printer copies can be made from the microfilm. Photographs will be permitted for the purpose of exhibition or publication.

Citations

The complex nature of the collection requires great attention to detail in citations, to ensure that sufficient information is given in accurate fashion.

The recommended style is as follows:

Some of the account books were not paginated before filming.
A frame counter was used to provide an accurate indication of place. The style of citation should then be

When ordering photocopies, the reel and frame numbers will be essential for locating the item(s) desired. The series numbers (I-IV) may be omitted, but the file or journal number (as in volumes 19 and 33) is indeed essential for identification.

INTRODUCTION

Notes sur l'histoire et le classement de la collectionProvenance

La majeure partie de la collection a été acquise en 1911. Il est possible de retrouver certaines descriptions extraites du catalogue de vente collés dans quelques volumes et sur certains documents (ex.: volume 192, dossier 5). Le volume 191 a été acquis vers 1923 mais a été placé sur les rayons que vers 1970. Le volume 192 a été créé en 1982 et se compose des pièces trouvées dans les séries I à IV qui n'avaient pas été préalablement décrites ainsi que d'un certain nombre de pièces acquises en 1971-1972 et en 1976 qui avaient été placées temporairement dans les volumes 43 et 45. Des notes supplémentaires sont fournies dans les listes détaillées de ces pièces et volumes.

L'intérêt de John Louis Hubert Neilson pour l'histoire peut expliquer la présence de certains documents aussi bien que les postes publics occupés par John Neilson, senior, peuvent justifier la présence d'autres documents sans aucun lien les uns avec les autres. Ayant agi comme agents, curateurs ou exécuteurs, John Neilson et ses fils ont accumulé une documentation variée qui se trouve maintenant avec les documents familiaux et d'affaires de la famille Neilson.

Classement

L'ordre des documents dans la collection est quelque peu déroutant. La notice d'inventaire donne une brève description de la documentation à l'aide de titres généraux tel que correspondance, comptes, documents successoraux et de dossiers par sujets. Le répertoire numérique du microfilm (voir pages xxii-xxxiv) fournit les titres des volumes en ordre numérique. Une liste des grandes catégories de documents (voir page xxi) donne un accès rapide aux volumes dont le contenu est assez varié.

Classement (suite)

La correspondance dans la série I n'est pas classée dans un ordre particulier bien que les lettres de la famille soient généralement séparées des lettres d'affaires et de contenu politique et légal. Les parties 2 et 3 du présent instrument de recherche fournissent des listes de cette correspondance (volumes 1-16, 18, 20, 32, 35-38) en ordre chronologique et en ordre alphabétique des auteurs. Cependant, il existe aussi de la correspondance parmi les documents d'affaires légaux et de succession. La correspondance d'affaires dans les séries II et III est généralement classée chronologiquement par ordre d'auteur.

Description

L'instrument de recherche no 119 donne une description des documents qui peut varier considérablement. Ainsi on peut tout aussi bien y retrouver une liste de dix pages décrivant le contenu d'un seul volume et une seule page de titres pour dix volumes. La description peut varier non seulement au niveau des volumes mais aussi au niveau des dossiers: le contenu d'un dossier peut être très détaillé alors que le suivant n'est que résumé.

Le classement et le contenu de plusieurs groupes d'archives d'affaires ou de succession demeurent sans explication. Les titres de volume (particulièrement dans la série I) indiquent la nature de la majorité des documents. La correspondance peut être aussi composée de comptes et autres pièces jointes. Les papiers de succession comme des testaments, des inventaires, des actes notariés et des baux peuvent être accompagnés de correspondance. Lorsque les lettres ont été classées en ordre alphabétique des auteurs, la liste descriptive peut, parfois, indiquer que leurs dates extrêmes et la pagination.

Des parties de la collection ont été décrites au moment de leur acquisition et les descriptions ont été publiées dans les rapports des Archives publiques. La correspondance officielle 1801-1824, de John Neilson est

décrise dans l'Appendice G, pages 104 à 157 du Rapport de 1913 et celle des années 1824 à 1847, dans le Rapport de 1918, Appendice D, pages 301 à 387.

Ces deux descriptions ont, depuis, été remplacées par celles se trouvant dans les parties 2 et 3 du présent instrument de recherche. Il n'existe aucune corrélation entre ces premières descriptions et le classement actuel de la correspondance.

La révision de l'instrument de recherche s'est limitée à l'addition de notes d'introduction et d'explication et à la systématisation des titres de volume. Le terme "miscellaneous" (divers) a été remplacé par des termes plus précis. Il a été impossible d'y apporter plus de modifications majeures; plusieurs volumes demeurent décrits en des termes généraux seulement. Les livres de comptes constituent un exemple de problème de description. Le chercheur est alors avisé de procéder prudemment, LA DESCRIPTION NE CONSTITUE QU'UN GUIDE GENERAL et ne doit pas être considérée comme une identification définitive de quelques ou toutes les parties de la collection.

Conservation

Lors de la préparation de la collection pour le microfilmage, les documents qui montraient des signes évidents de détérioration ou de fragilité furent réparés. La reliure de certains registres de correspondance fut enlevée car la méthode employée pour relier le volume était alors la cause de dommages causés aux documents. Lorsque c'était possible, la reliure originale des registres, des livres de comptes et autres fut préservée. A l'exception des documents transférés dans le volume 192, l'intégrité de la numérotation originale des volumes a été respectée.

Microfilm

Le filmage a commencé en 1980 et sera complété d'ici 1983. Les volumes sont microfilmés avec les parties de l'instrument de recherche correspondant à leur description. Lorsque l'ensemble du travail sera terminé, un répertoire numérique du microfilm révisé sera ajouté à l'instrument de recherche et ce guide sera filmé pour le bénéfice des chercheurs qui utilisent le service du prêt entre bibliothèques. Comme mesure de protection, la collection sera retirée de la circulation. LES CHERCHEURS SONT PRIÉS D'UTILISER LE MICROFILM plutot que les documents originaux. La reproduction photographique endommage les documents et donc, doit être évitée. Cependant, des copies peuvent être faites à partir du microfilm au moyen d'un lecteur-reproducteur. La permission de photographier les documents sera accordée pour des fins d'exposition ou de publication.

La nature complexe de la collection requiert d'être très attentif aux détails quand on veut citer certaines parties de la collection et d'être certain que toute l'information nécessaire est donnée. La manière suivante est recommandée:
