Mr Curran was born in Ireland and Immigrated as a child with his parents to the Orillia area. He first worked on the Toronto World newspaper in the 1880's and other newspapers afterwards. He was the owner and Editor of the Sault Daily Star from 1912 until his death. He operated the Weekly Star at the Sault between 1901 and 1912. He published several books including Here Was Vinland and Wolves Don't Bite in 1939 and 1943 respectively which were very popular.

The microfilm was copied from the original manuscripts which were loaned for copying by the Trent University Archives by Ms. Bernadine Dodge for preservation and inter-library loan.

Finding Aid No. 1280 is a descriptive file list.

The correspondence is arranged alphabetically in 42 files. Outstanding correspondents are Diamond Jenness, Vilhjalmur Stefansson and Lawrence J. Burpee. Most of the letters concern the Norse in Greenland and in North America and relics of possible Norse origin found from Ontario to Saskatchewan and neighboring US states.
