Hamnett Kirkes Pinhey (1784-1857) was born at Plymouth Dock, Devonshire, and educated at Christ's Hospital, London. He became a partner in a merchandizing and shipping business, whose ships regularly ran the French blockade during the Napoleonic wars. Pinhey himself served as a king's messenger and carried despatches overland to Berlin. After the war, he sold his business and, in 1820, emigrated to March Township in Upper Canada, where he received an estate of 1000 acres in recognition of his valuable wartime services. He was a leader, and unofficial banker, of the community and became a member of the Legislative Council, 1847-1857. The Pinhey house at Horaceville (named after Hamnett K. Pinhey's eldest son) was the first recommended to the nation for purchase in 1959 by the National Capital Commission. (For further information, see Looking Back..., by Naomi Slater Heydon (Ottawa: 1980). Further material relating to the Pinhey family, is found in MG 24, I 9; MG 24, D 1; MG 28 III 46; and MG 30, D 1, volume 24, pages 841-844).

Finding Aid No. 1130 provides a descriptive list of the papers, as well as an index to the accounts in File 6; nominal and subject entries have been made in the General Index. The Finding Aid was microfilmed in 1981 with the collection (see reel H-924).

Letter, 26 October 1849, from artist Cornelius Krieghoff (c.1812-1872) to the Hon. Hamnett K. Pinhey, asking for his recommendation for the commission to paint a portrait of Queen Victoria required for the Parliament Building, following the Montreal fire of 1849 (File 3). Copy presented in 1974 by the Bytown Museum, Ottawa.

Three letters to the Hon. Hamnett K. Pinhey relating to the commission given to George T. Berthon (1806-1892) for painting a portrait of the Queen for the Parliament Building, following the Montreal fire of 1849. Included is the original of the above letter from Krieghoff, which has been placed in security storage. (File 4). Originals acquired in 1978.

Diaries, 1821-1840, 1846, 1854. Originals, 4 cm. Microfilm. 1 reel, M-5567.

Notebooks of daily records, 19 September 1821 - 31 December 1828 in the hand of Hamnett Kirkes Pinhey, and 2 January - 31 December 1837, mainly in the hand of his elder daughter Constance. The entries regularly record the weather, events, tasks assigned to house servants, farm labourers, workmen, etc., as well as occasional comments on health, meals eaten, letters received and written, inventories and accounts of various sorts, diagrams of land and building projects. There

are also indexed accounts, 1821-1829, of individuals and families in March Township, of the Pinhey farm, household, tolls, etc., and of such firms as Forsyth, Richardson & Co. of Montreal, and Philemon Wright & Sons. Also included are 23 additional leaves containing rough notes and other miscellaneous items, n.d., 1824-1829, 1846, and 1854. (File 6). The originals have been placed in security storage and a photocopy is available for research purposes (a microfilm copy is also available on reel H-924). Presented in 1980 by C. Dyson Pinhey of Ottawa, a great-grandson of Horace Pinhey, the eldest son of Hamnett Kirkes Pinhey, through the courtesy of Philip E. Gerrard.

INTRODUCTION

The Pinhey Family

The Pinhey family in Canada began with Hammett Kirkes Pinhey (1784-1857), who was born at Plymouth Dock, Devonshire, and was educated at Christ's Hospital, London, the famous Blue Coat school. He became a partner in a merchandizing and shipping business, whose ships regularly ran the French blockade during the Napoleonic wars. Pinhey himself served as a king's messenger and carried despatches overland to Berlin. After the war, he sold his business and, in 1820, emigrated to March township, Upper Canada, where he received an estate of 1000 acres in recognition of his valuable wartime services. He was a leader, and unofficial banker, of the community and became a member of the Legislative Council, 1847-1857. The Pinhey house at Horaceville (named after Hammett Pinhey's eldest son) was the first recommended to the nation for purchase in 1959 by the National Capital Commission. Provenance

The Pinhey family material at the P.A.C. consists of a number of miscellaneous items acquired at different times from various sources. In 1969, a letter of 20 February 1837 from Thomas Lancaster to Hammett K. Pinhey at Horaceville was copied from the original in the Mitchell Library, Sydney, Australia, through the courtesy of Dr. H.T. Douglas of Ottawa. In the following year, a further nine items were copied from the same source. These included other letters from Thomas Lancaster to Hammett K. Pinhey and his mother, Mary Townley Pinhey, as well as three charts of the various branches of the Pinhey family, and some other items of genealogical interest. In 1974, the Bytown Museum donated a copy of a letter to Hammett K. Pinhey from the artist Cornelius Krieghoff. The provenance of this letter was unknown at the time of the gift, but the

original from which it was copied was acquired from Charles C. Hill of Ottawa in 1979 with two others which also related to arrangements for the painting of a portrait of Queen Victoria for the Legislative building, to replace one damaged in the Montreal fire of 1849. Later in 1979, Mrs. Snelgrove of Ottawa allowed the P.A.C. to make copies of the genealogical and other material found in the family Prayer Book-cum-Bible of Hamnett K. Pinhey which was in her possession. In 1980, Mr. C. Dyson Pinhey of Ottawa presented a number of Hamnett K. Pinhey's notebooks, containing his diaries and accounts, 1821-1829. Then, in 1981, the National Postal Museum, Ottawa, presented copies of two business letters from Daniel McMartin to Hamnett K. Pinhey. Finally, in 1982, a microfilm copy of Hamnett K. Pinhey's notebooks containing his diaries and accounts, 1829 - 1840, was obtained from the Archives of Ontario, Toronto, through an exchange arrangement.

Related Material at the P.A.C.

Other material relating to the Pinhey family, and to its Hill and other descendants, may be found in MG 24, I 9; MG 24, D 1; MG 28, III 46; and MG 30, D 1, Volume 24, pages 841-844.

The Finding Aid

The finding aid provides a descriptive list of material in the collection, which is arranged in six files according to the provenance of the papers. It also provides a chronological resumé of the accounts in File 6, and an alphabetical index to the accounts of persons and firms in File 6. The shelf list for microfilm reel M-5567 is also included.

Pagination

The reader should note that although the material in File 2 and part of that in File 6 is

paginated, the collection as a whole is not. For the convenience of researchers, frame numbers have been supplied on reel H-924 for the microfilm copies of the material, but these do not appear on the documents themselves. No frame numbers are provided on reel M-5567, and only the accounts at the end of the diaries on that reel are paginated.

The Microfilm Copies

In 1981, Files 1-6 were microfilmed on reel H-924. Two measures taken at the time of filming should be noted:

- 1) The three family charts in File 1 were reconstructed from the seven sections in which they had been photocopied from the original, so that it could be filmed as a whole. Since the increase in intelligibility was achieved at the cost of decreased legibility, the seven separate sections were also filmed.

- 2) The notebooks in File 6, which contained the diaries and accounts of Hamnett K. Pinhey, were removed from the twentieth century binding in which they had been received. This permitted the greater part of the accounts to be separated from the diaries and allowed the pages to be arranged in accordance with H.K. Pinhey's page numbers, which had been bound in an erratic sequence likely to be very confusing to researchers. The peculiar order in which the pages were found was believed to be original, however, and was therefore restored after filming, before the notebooks were placed in security storage. The order shown in the finding aid is that of the microfilm. A list showing the original order has been retained in the office in the SNAP file relating to the acquisition, and the photocopies which replace the originals in File 6 have been given hand written page numbers corresponding to the original order, as well as printed numbers corresponding to the order on the microfilm, so that the original arrangement can be easily ascertained by any researcher who cares to know it.
