Born in Prince Edward Island, John Andrew Macphail attended McGill University receiving his M.D. in 1891. He practiced medicine and taught medicine. In 1907, he was appointed McGill's first professor of the history of medicine. Macphail published more than ten books and many essays. Among his shorter pieces were: Essays in Puritanism (1905), Essays in Politics (1909) and Essays in Fallacys (1910). Among the subjects about which he wrote were: literary and religious figures, contemporary political issues, feminism, modern education and theological trends. A biographical sketch of Sir Andrew Macphail is included in the finding aid.

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

Sir Andrew Macphail, Kt. O.B.E., B.A., M.D., C.M., LL.D.,
M.R.C.S., L.R.C.P., F.R.S.C.

The Man born at Orwell, P.E.I., 24th November 1864

grandson of William Macphail I (1802-1852) of Inverairnie, Scotland, who migrated in 1832 for Montreal but was shipwrecked off the coast of P.E.I.; William Macphail I, salvaging only a spinning wheel and a copy of Horace opened a Latin school.

son of William Macphail II (1830-1905), who was brought from Scotland by his parents in 1832; William Macphail II was a teacher and inspector of schools (1847-1868) and later supervisor of the Public Hospital for the Insane, Charlottetown.

John Andrew Macphail attended rural school at Orwell, won a scholarship and attended Prince of Wales College: taught in Fanning Grammar School at eighteen: entered McGill 1885; B.A. in 1888, M.D. and C.M., 1891: worked as a journalist and tutor and not only paid all college expenses, but left with a surplus: travelled to the Orient and round the world (1891): one year's work in London Hospitals (M.R.C.S.; L.R.C.P.; 1892): married, 1893, Georgina Burland (d. 1902): two children, Jeffrey and Dorothy (Mrs. Lionel Lindsay): Professor of Pathology, Bishop's College, Montreal, Pathologist Western Hospital and Verdun Hospital (1895-1906): Professor of the History of Medicine, McGill (1906-1937): Fellow McGill University (1909): Went overseas as Lieutenant, later Major, with No. 6 Field Ambulance 1915-served till end of war: Cavendish Lecturer 1917: created Knight Bachelor 1918: Sometime Editor University Magazine, Canadian Medical Journal, Lorne Pierce Medallist of Royal Society of Canada 1930: author of "Essays in Puritanism," 1905; "Vine of Sibmah," 1905; "Essays in Politics," 1909; "Essays in Fallacy," 1910; "Book of Sorrow," 1915; "Life of John McCrea," 1918; "Maria Chapdelaine" (translation), 1921, "Official History of the Canadian Forces in the Great War," 1914-1919; Vol. 1. "Medical Services," 1925; "Three Person," 1929; "The Bible in Scotland," 1931; "The Master's Wife," (published posthumously by son and daughter): contributor of hundreds of articles, poems, plays to magazines, journals, and newspapers.

died in Montreal, 23rd September, 1938.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION OF MACPHAIL PAPERS

Sir Andrew Macphail's papers were presented as a gift to the Public Archives of Canada by his daughter, Mrs. Dorothy Lindsay, from 1973-1974. Ranging in dates from 1816-1938, they consist of the original correspondence, diaries, manuscripts, reprints and newspaper clippings. An analysis of the unit reveals a possible delineation of the material for purposes of description into 3 broad categories: papers which deal with his personal and family life, manuscripts and correspondence which reveal his literary genius, and also the related papers of his father and grandfather.

As a member of an extremely large family (grandfather having 8 children, his father, ten) Andrew Macphail had to leave the shelter of his family home early in life, but he never lost the meaning of "close family ties." As a result, the majority of his correspondence is with members of his family -- his brothers and sisters, as well as with his only son and daughter. Other personal correspondence is with old school chums and relates his contacts during an important phase of his life: his stay at Malpeque, P.E.I., as the Principal of Fanning Grammar School. This appointment to the school from 1882-1885 started him on his road to success. In his book "The Master's Wife", he wrote:

"At Christmas I secured the coveted Fanning Grammar School and at the age of eighteen was drawing a salary of three hundred and eighty dollars a year. No earthly power could touch me. I was free of work forever."

The largest group of correspondence which has been preserved are the letters of the war years which he received from his brother Jim, a Major, and his son Jeffrey a Lance Corporal with Field Co. No. 2, Canadian Engineers, and from his daughter Dorothy. Early in World War I, Macphail followed his only son to the front, leaving behind his teenage daughter in Canada. The letters from Dorothy which followed him as he organized Field Ambulance No. 6 overseas, reveal the closeness of the family unit, the stoicism which she displayed throughout the hardships of the war, and the pride she felt that "her men" were duty bound for King and Empire. Jim and Jeffrey's correspondence provide descriptive accounts of camp activity and training both in Canada and abroad, the rules and regulations which were made or ignored, the morale of the company, the difficulties of obtaining promotion and leave, and the difference between the Canadian and British "boys."

Perhaps the most interesting and analytical descriptions of the first world war, which brought with it, as all wars do, political ineptitude, official mismanagement of clothing and war supplies, "stupid officers" and military red tape, came from the pen of Sir Andrew himself. Three volumes of a diary which he kept throughout the war years contain serious criticisms as well as humorous generalities which only an individual of Macphail's mature years and literary ability could produce. For example, he wrote:

"On the Belgian Ordinance map, which the Germans use, this building is shown as being on the opposite side of the road; and the field where they suppose it to be has been shelled, so that it looks like a place where an infinite pig was rooting. The Belgian maps are deliberately wrong, which shows that the Belgians never trusted the Germans."

Sir Andrew Macphail was a Canadian medical man, who while eminent in his chosen profession, carved out for himself an abiding place in the realm of Canadian letters. In his papers one can find ample proof of his literary excellence. Aside from the correspondence which deals with his publishing copyrights, the unit contains articles, radio addresses, lectures, plays, and poems totalling approximately 172 in number, all masterfully created by Sir Andrew. His subjects are never the same, and his knowledge of words and keen sense of mind produced what seemed an unending flow of analytical, thought-provoking, and controversial articles ranging from "On Certain Aspects of Feminism" to "Bigotry in Parliament."

Despite the abundance of wealth in Sir Andrew, the P.A.C. also possesses the papers of his predecessors. The papers of William Macphail I (b. 1802 - d. 1852) contain Sir Andrew's grandfather's application for a teaching position from the Edinburgh University Chambers prior to his emigration, and family correspondence after 1832. The papers of William Macphail II (b. 1830 - d. 1905) give insight into the educational system of Prince Edward Island. His many letters of recommendation from P.E.I. officials and inhabitants, his teaching certificates, his application to the government for the position of visitor of schools and his subsequent reports, shed much light on the background from which young Andrew blossomed.

These related papers also clearly indicate the religious nature of P.E.I. settlements. Minutes of meetings held by church elders from 1854-1869, the building of a memorial for the Rev. Donald MacDonald who rooted the Church

of Scotland in P.E.I., and after his death the attempts to secure another minister for the congregation, help explain why Sir Andrew was proud of the designation conferred upon him as "the last and sole survivor of the Church of Scotland on the mainland of North America."

Sir Andrew once wrote: "History is the master to which all must go - history with its pensive and melancholy face." Sir Andrew is now and will always be before the master. Yet with the presentation of the Sir Andrew Macphail papers to the P.A.C. one can almost see that pensive and melancholy face begin to brighten as the tasks of the master become a lighter burden on his shoulders.
