LICENSING POLICY STATEMENTS OF GENERAL APPLICATION

[Note: The following table includes all general statements relating to licensing policy issued by the BBG or CRTC up to the time of publication other than those made only in regard to specific station applications. In order to provide a complete chronological picture, the list also includes selected federal government statements of licensing policy where these directly affect BBG or CRTC decisions. It will be realized that a number of licensing policies (for example, the policy against "religious-only" stations, or against chartered banks taking equity positions in broadcasting undertakings, or against duopoly ownership in the same language) have been enunciated only in connection with the denial of specific applications, and so are not noted below. For complete references to all such decisions and policies, see the listings in the subsequent tables of decisions, and the discussion in Chapters 7, 8 and 9 of the text under the appropriate heading. Most of the policy statements referred to below are reproduced in Canadian Telecommunications Reports. The material below also does not include changes in the Rules of Procedure. See Appendix E for the text of the Rules, and Chapter 6 for a complete discussion of them.]

The list below also omits BBG or CRTC policy statements relating to the introduction or interpretation of specific program content or advertising regulations under the Broadcasting Act. These announcements (usually made in the form of Announcements, Press Releases or Circulars) are detailed in full in the discussion of the particular regulations in Chapters 12 and 13. The table below does however include reference to BBG or CRTC statements involving the introduction or amendment of regulations where these directly relate to licensing (for example, network formation or foreign-language broadcasting.)

[3]	TV	Second (Alternative) Television Service in French and English, BBG Announcement, July 28, 1959	One station per area policy abandoned in Vancouver, Edmonton, Calgary, Winnipeg, Toronto, Ottawa, Montreal and Halifax. Hearings announced for applications for second English VHF television licences in eight centres and a second French VHF licence in Montreal. Board announces "basic principles" upon which new draft television regulations will be based, subject to hearing in November, 1959. Principles include indefinite freeze on third television service; commercial TV not to start until 12 noon; Canadian content to be not less than 55% per week except for Commonwealth and French credits; no direct U.S. network connection save with BBG approval; and up to 2 hours between 8 - 11 p.m. to be reserved for "purposes to be prescribed by BBG." [4] TV Television Regulations and Licensing Policy, BBG Announcement, November 18, 1959.

Lengthy announcement reviewing submissions at hearing on second service policy and discussing principles underlying newly adopted television regulations. Confirmation that no more than one additional television service in any one language will be recommended for any area. Freeze on third service to remain in effect until a change announced. New regulations cover limitations on morning broadcasting, eventual 55% Canadian quota for each 4-week period subject to Board guidelines, prohibition of affiliation with U.S. networks, provision allowing Board to require stations to enter into program contracts with other parties, prohibition of contests where results are determined in advance.

Statement in connection with AM applications in Winnipeg and Calgary that additional AM applications will be deferred in these markets pending the development of alternative television service.

[6] TV CHEK-TV Adjacent Channel Interference Report, BBG Announcement, September 29 1960

Report of BBG inquiry (September 15-16, 1960) into interference of CHEK-TV, Victoria (6) with reception of KING, Seattle (5) in Vancouver, following CHEK-TV's increase to maximum power. Board rejects proposals for alternative antenna site or reduction in power; recommends that affected viewers install receiving set traps, and that more flexibility in access to American programming consistent with the 55% rule be arranged between CBUT and CHEK-TV. CHEK-TV commitments not to solicit local advertising in Vancouver noted.

CHEK-TV was later released from its local sales commitment in reference [10] below.

Announcement of regulations governing the formation of television networks and the deposit of affiliation agreements with the Board (following original announcement on June 30, 1960, and public hearing on September 1-2, 1960). Licensing conditions include minimum reserved time and preference to a network operator minority owned but not controlled by affiliated stations.

[8] TV Administrative Policy Regarding Television Networks, BBG Announcement, December 19, 1960

Reconsideration of definition of "network"; exemption of non-electronic networks from requiring Board approval where the affiliation agreements provide for less than four hours per week of reserved time.

[9] AM, FM Lifting of Freeze for Radio Applications in Second Television Service Markets, BBG Announcement, September 5, 1961

Announcement that the freeze on radio applications in second television station markets will be lifted, effective January 1, 1962. Pending AM and FM decisions in Montreal, Toronto, and Winnipeg deferred, so as to allow other applicants to be heard in early 1962.

[10] FM Development of FM Broadcasting, BBG Announcement, November 10, 1961 (BBG Circular 46)

General statement on historical development of FM in Canada, technical considerations in FM spectrum use, and nature of FM audience. Board states that it expects FM applicants to offer a "real alternative" to AM programming, a limitation on commercials, and some non-recorded programs. Expects joint AM-FM ownership but seeks commitments for progressively increased separate programming.

[11] AM Clear Channels on which Canada has a 1A and 1B Priority, BBG Announcement, December 7, 1961

Because of the necessity of relying on sky waves to supply national AM service to wide sections of Canada, the Board will continue as a general rule to recommend the use of clear channels of 1A priority for CBC stations only, when such stations are afforded 1B protection.

[12] TV Cross-Programming, BBG Announcement, December 7, 1961

Discussion of carriage of CTV programming by CBC affiliates and vice versa. Stations carrying such cross-programming cannot run it during reserved times, nor represent themselves as part of the supplying network. Simultaneous carriage of cross-programming limited to four hours per week, with Board approval. Non-simultaneous cross-programming requires Board approval unless less than four hours per week.

[13] AM, TV Rebroadcasting Stations, BBG Announcement, December 11, 1961

General policy enunciated with regard to the licensing of rebroadcasting stations. Board concedes that alternative television service will proceed slowly, but feels that it is not the function of a VIF rebroadcasting station to extent its A or B contour into the A or B contour of an existing station except when

language is different, existing station is in a different province, or where existing station's service is clearly inadequate. Channel priority to be given to national service. AM rebroadcasters felt to be of only limited value; will not normally be licensed in areas receiving satisfactory service from one or more Canadian stations. Exceptions from this policy (besides those above) include substantial use of frequency to provide wide coverage and strong community of interest.

Policy paper reviews Canadian legislation relating to partisan political programs or announcements, and notes Board's administrative rulings on meaning of "dramatization", effect of pre-election day blackout, creation of subsidiary networks, and on allocation of free time (Board to act as arbiter if no agreement can be reached between network and parties). Board to notify stations as to effective date of commencement of campaign. Short statement of Board policy on controversial broadcasting: Board not to act as censor; no network time to be sold to individuals or commercial organizations for the broadcasting of their opinions; equal facilities for opposing views to be provided by stations if controversial programs or editorials are presented; no network editorials permitted.

The genesis for this statement may be found in the CBC Board of Governors White Paper issued in July, 1939. For a clarification of the phrase "unnecessarily theatrical" see BBG Circular 57, March 12, 1962. The portions of this policy relating to controversial programming were reaffirmed by the BBG in 1966 in Sudbury - CKSO-TV, 66 BBG Decisions (Jul 11), B51:393-460 (increase in power application). [15] AM, FM Foreign-Language Broadcasting, BBG Announcement, January 22, 1962

Board concedes need for broadcasting in languages other than English and French "to help in the task of integration". Board will license radio stations to devote 25-40% of 6 a.m. - 12 midnight period to foreign language programming provided 150,000 - 200,000 potential listeners with mother tongues other than English or French live within area proposed to be served. Radio licensees devoting less than 15% to foreign languages will not require Board permission. Licensees of stations offering foreign programming are fully responsible for content, and must be aware of English or French equivalent.

The basic policy issues here were first discussed in hearing B3:122-189 in the 1959 Stanczykowski Montreal AM application, which was later approved on March 21, 1962, following hearing B25:440-461. The foreign language policy was later enacted in somewhat revised form as part of the AM Regulations. See hearing B30:223-225.

[16] TV CHEK-TV Sales Practices, BBG Announcement, March 29, 1962

CHEK-TV, Victoria, is released from its earlier commitment (made in connection with its power increase granted on January 30, 1960) not to solicit local advertising in Vancouver or the Lower Mainland.

[17] TV Educational Television Policy, BBG Announcement, March 30, 1962

Board prepared to consider requests from authorized educational bodies to reserve ETV channels. Channel 19 so reserved for ETV in Toronto. Such requests must be supported by all educational authorities in area. UHF channels will be readily reserved; available VHF's will be reserved only if implementation likely to follow rapidly. Board also outlines procedures under s.6(6) of the TV Regulations, where educational authorities can assume responsibility for certain programming over private stations (to be deemed 100% Canadian content) following completion of arrangements with such stations and submission to Board.

[18] TV Extension of Alternative Television Service, BBG Announcement, December 20, 1962

General statement of historical and economic considerations underlying extension of second service in English and French television. Extension of CTV or CFTM-TV by rebroadcasters rejected because of prejudice to continuance of primary service in single-service areas. Board feels that "second" local stations are not in immediate future save in Quebec City. Difficulties with twin-stick and CBC network relays pointed out, although latter viewed with promise. Board willing to extend CBC to one-operated-station-per-province, preferably in the capital city.

Announcement that Board had formed conclusion, following hearing that "the time had not yet arrived when the Board could recommend that colour TV begin in Canada." Board would not set date for implementation but would keep close watch on the situation.

Following application by CBC for "reservation" of VHF channels in Saint John-Fredrickton (9), Sudbury-Sturgeon Falls (4), Saskatoon (11), P.E.I. (8), Sherbrooke (9), Three Rivers (8), Fort William (4), Regina (13), Calgary (9) and Victoria (10), Board recommends that Minister reserve first three channels only for CBC use. Board declines on make recommendation on remainder.

"Troika" of Andrew Stewart, BBG Chairman, Alphonse Ouimet, CBC President, and Don Jamieson, CAB President, present interim report to Minister of Transport. Report recommends that freeze be placed on applications for extension of alternative television service at least until July 1, 1964. Recommendation implemented by Minister of Transport.

Freeze announced on new CATV applications pending determination of government policy following BBG hearing into question of effect of CATV on conventional broadcasting on June 4, 1963. Joint BBG - Department of Transport committee set up to recommend any legislative changes that appear necessary.

CATV Recommended Legislative Changes, Report of Joint BBG-DOT Committee on Community Antenna Television, March 19, 1964.

Joint committee report recommends that Broadcasting Act be amended to cover commercial broadcasting receiving stations, to have the Minister refer CATV applications to the BBG, to limit foreign ownership of CATV, to give Board authority to control CATV networking where broadcast signals are involved, to allow Board to regulate land receiving stations in regard to program content and other non-technical matters, and to add other wide regulatory powers regarding conditions of licence.

Final report of troika tabled in House of Commons; demonstrates important areas of disagreement between Stewart, Ouimet and Jamieson. Secretary of State Lamontagne announces establishment of Fowler Committee on broadcasting, to study possible amendments to the Broadcasting Act, to appraise CBC organization and financing, and to examine methods of extending alternative television service. CATV excluded from purview of committee in light of reference [23] above. Freeze on alternative service applications extended until after Fowler committee can hand down its report.

Announcement of general government policies towards CATV. Regulations passed applying foreign ownership restrictions to CATV operators. Freeze on CATV applications lifted. Minister announces that all such applications will be dealt with only after informal consultation with the BBG on the possible effect on television broadcasting in the area concerned. Applications will not receive approval if they are likely to make the operation of any existing station uneconomic or to inhibit the provision of alternate Canadian television

Fowler Committee report submitted on September 1, 1965. (Committee consisted of Robert M. Fowler, Marc Lalonde, and G.G.E. Steele). Recommends reorganized BBG with wider powers, including power to annex specific licence conditions. New authority to be made up of a full-time Chairman and 14 part-time members. Strong criticism of CBC organization and private television performance.

Following decision by government to permit applications under Radio Act for colour television transmission to begin on January 1, 1967, and announcement of three-phase implementation program, BBG announces its plan to recommend approval for colour transmission by stations in four categories, following hearing to determine whether such transmission would impede extension of television service.

[28] AM Holding of Tapes for Libel Actions, BBG Announcement, December 1, 1965 (BBG Circular 124)

Procedure by Board to apply where members of public request release of AM tapes because of possible grounds for legal action. Person aggrieved may request tape from station in writing within 30 days of date of broadcast. Station may or may not release tape but must preserve it. If not released, Board will, upon application by aggrieved person, obtain it and permit him to audit it at offices of the Board.

Board announces interim renewal of 72 licences for one year, pending revision of Act following government study of Fowler report. Licensees warned that Board intends to resume practice of reviewing program performance at public hearings in the following year, based on licensee's promises, obligations or conditions.

Freeze on alternative television service lifted, subject to reservation of CBC channels in Victoria, Saskatoon, Sudbury and Saint John - Fredericton. BBG will need to satisfy itself of commercial viability of any second stations. BBG to have power to impose individual licence conditions, and to investigate media ownership subject to cabinet direction. Government to consider new federal organization to provide ETV facilities for provincial use. New legislation will also bring CATV under BBG control.

Review of permissible terms in contracts between Canadian AM and FM licensees and U.S. radio networks. No licensee can represent itself as part of such a network; contracts must be filed with the Board; Board does not intend to limit access to American news but expects full reports as to time occupied by foreign-supplied material.

[33] AM, Extension of Television Service, BBG Announcement, October 5, 1966

Reaction of BBG to White Paper (reference 31 above). Board indicates concern for commercial viability in smaller centres. Freeze imposed on new AM applications where local radio and television is already available. Freeze continued on applications for "third" commercial television stations, although ETV stations will not be precluded. Board declares its resolve to ensure the continuation of local television service where presently available. Board feels that "the best long-run pattern of alternative television service" is a combination of a CBC O&O station and a privately owned station. Board will not recommend an extension of alternative televi-

This freeze for third television service re-affirmed reference [4] above. The freeze was lifted in Montreal and Toronto in reference [35] below, then reimposed in reference [36]. Eventually, after the further delays noted in reference [42], the CRTC removed the freeze for Toronto at least in reference [78], and also where in reference [97]. The freeze on AM applica-

[34] AM CBC Network Disaffiliation Policy, BBG Announcement, October 5, 1966

Board announces its policy on the criteria for disaffiliation of private radio stations from the CBC network. Approving recommendations of government-industry advisory committee set up on June 20, 1966. Board announces that each disaffiliation application will be reviewed on its individual merits. No attempt will be made to establish a theoretical technical formula that can be applied automatically.

[35] TV Policies Relating to Development of UHF, BBG Announcement, November 25, 1966

General review of policies with regard to frequency allocation, the opening up of the UHF band, educational television, and NTV satellite proposal. Satellite proposal referred to cabinet for study. Shift by CBLT Toronto from Channel 6 to 5 favoured by Board in order to open up Channel 6 for CBC use in London. Board recommends transfer of Channel 9 from Quebec City to Sherbrook. Declines to make recommendation on proposal for shift of Channel 8 from Summerside to Amherst. Board recommends that applications be accepted for UHF stations, including additional television licences in Montreal and Toronto. Legislative imposition of requirement for UHF reception capability on all television sets favoured by Board. Alternative means for providing educational television service are reviewed; Board declines to reserve channels for ETV on an extensive basis save where immediate implementation is foreseen. Channel 19 reservation for ETV in Toronto re-affirmed.

For the hearing upon which this announcement was based, see E53:1-262. For original Channel 19 reservation see reference [17] above. For the aftermath of the NTV satellite proposal, see reference [36] below. Following its recommendation that applications now be accepted for additional TV licences in Toronto and Montreal, the Board later announced on December 29, 1966 that it would hear such applications (either VHF or, more likely, UHF) in 1967. Later on Feb. 27, 1967, it announced that the VHF proposals had proven to be technically unacceptable, but it would go ahead with Toronto UHF applications anyway. The only one submitted did not meet the cutoff date, however, and an indefinite postponement was later announced in reference [38] below.

[36] TV Hearing on Implications of Space Satellites for Television Broadcasting, BBG Announcement, November 30, 1966.

Following the presentation of the NTV satellite proposal at hearing B53:1-262, Board announces special hearing commencing March 7, 1967 to consider the implications of space satellite distribution of television signals and to provide an opportunity for comments from CBC, CTV, CN/CPT, TCTS, and others. (Kenneth D. Soble passed away in December, 1966, but his associates in NTV and Power Corporation continued with the proposal at the eventual BBG hearing).

For the eventual hearing see B56:1-196. No announcement was made by the Board regarding this matter after the hearing. For later presentations to the CRTC based on the space satellite concept however, see C2:111-145 (NTV) and C28:329-529 (Global Communications Ltd.). 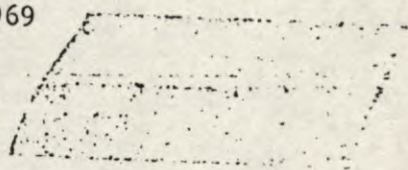
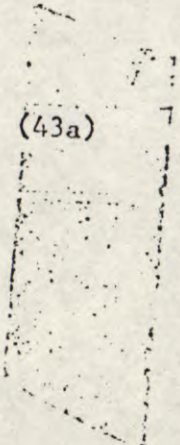

CATV local programming strongly encouraged, so long as it complements and does not compete with programming available through off-air TV or movie theatres. No alteration of received signals to be permitted save where approved by Commission or unless required by law. No commercials to be originated by CATV systems, save in special circumstances. Boundaries of CATV system will be described on licence; Commission will not issue overlapping licences, unless public interest showing is made.
