STORY:

Following the occupation of Chartres, France, by American Forces, it didn't take the Fightin French of the Interior (F.F.I.), long to aid the armies of liberation in freeing the city of the last of German forces. Banding themselves together into an Army, The F.F.I. rendered valuable aid in directing the American troops and also in ferriting out German snipers from houses and other places where they had taken up position, sniping sniping at everyone and everything that went by. Prior to the entering of the U. S. Sroops, bombing of the outskirst of the city had killed a number of the F.F.I.s in addition, bullets from German weapons ended the lives of a number of others. So five days after the first American troops entered the city, a joint funeral was held for all the victims to the famous cathedral in Chartres. Here Mass was said for the fallen while practically all the residents of the community turned out to pay homage to their fellow countrymen. The coffins were carried to and from the Cathedral on horse drawn wagons while members of the F.F.I. acted as a guard of honour.

- 39069 A picture taken from the Church entrance looking out as the coffin of one of the victims was carried into the edific by firemen of Chartres who are wearing the uniform of the fire service, blue trousers and tunics with chromiun plated helmets.
- 39070 Pictured here are members of the F.F.I. as they marched into the Catherdral carrying their weapons at the trail.

First Canadians in Paris were members of the Canadian Film and Photo Unit, who arrived yesterday morning at nine o(clock. Later that same afternoon memberd of 3 Public Relations Group, consisting of conducting officers, war correspondents and drivers, arrived to set up transmission facilities. Early this morning (Saturday) Lt. Col R. Malone, officer commanding No 3 Public Relations Group, pinned the Canadian Flag on the railing of a balcony on the Canadian Legation Building in Paris. He was assisted by Emile Damesme, a former employee of the Canadian Legation.

STORY: Occupation of Paris by Allied Troops.

Residents of Paris went wild with enthusiasm as French and American troops occupied the city and drove the remaining Germans from its environments. Considerable fighting occurred in the city this morning as the troops cleared the Germans from buildings and strong points. But this did not stop the population from turning out, to give tremendous welcome to the troops. At times the people had to take shelter behind walls, etc., from flying bullets. After the shooting would die down they would rush on to the streets again and there shout and cheer the soldiers on.

Following the liberation of Ramouillet, France, by the American Army, a ceremony was held in the Public Square commemorating the liberation when a plaque was unveiled denoting that this square would henceforth be called "La Place de le Liberation". Speeches were given by M. Degois, mayor of Rambouillet, and M. LeCroquer, one armed former deputy from Parts and present member of the committee of Liberation under Gen DeGaulle.

Less than a week after Rambouillet France was liberated by American Forces, a French Armoured Division under Gen LeClerc, swept through the town whose streets were packed with cheering, shouting and hand waving residents. Close on the heels of the armourded division came Gen De aulle, leader of the Free French People, who spent the night in Rambouillet before proceeding on into Paris, 35 miles distant. The armoured division was given a tremendous reception as it passed through the town on its way to Paris, there to liberate a city whose populace had been under German domination for over four years.

STORY: French Armoured Division Entering City.

Today was a joyous day for the populace of Paris, France, As the French Armoured Division, which had been waiting on the outskirts of the metroplolis, rolled into the city, freeing the residents from frank German aggression. Thousands of people hammed the streets to welcome the troops and so dense were they at times that they stopped the vehicles. Police had to clear a way for the armoured vehicles to roll forwards to the centre of Paris where fighting is still going on. Flowers, fruit, wine, and cigarettes were thrown to the troops as they crept along the crowd lined streets. Members of the Free French Resistence Movement aided the troops in hunting out remaining pockets of German resistence.

Story: Official reception for Gen. De Gaulle

A joyous occasion for the people of Paris - the official visit of Gen. De Gaulle was turned into chaos this afternoon when German snipers opened up on the assembled thousands in front of Notre Dame Cathedral, and in the ensuing wild scrable by the people for shelter, hundreds were injured. The French Armoured Division, which had been a ssembled for the occasion opened fire in return and members of the F.F.I. hunted out the snipers from their various places of vantage. Gun fire from both sides continued for some time on the streets of Paris.
