offered to us by Irene Ben-Tchavtchavadze, 22 and, after consultation with Michael Hood, offered which she accepted.

She obtained the papers as a gift from Leo Brückner whose sister, Mrs. Küchler, spent her years after World War II living with Leo Schlesinger, the brother of Bruno Walter, in Sweden (Stockholm).

Leo Schlesinger, to whom most of the letters are addressed, died in Sweden in 1952. Mrs. Küchler had been in a Nazi concentration camp but survived. She is also dead now.

Leo Brückner's wife came from Riga, Latvia, like Mrs. Ben-Tchavtchavadze. He came from Czechoslovakia.

Leo Schlesinger and his sister Emma had been in exile in Sweden since Bruno Walter was able to plead on their behalf with a Sweidsh official he met.

Mrs. B-T came to Canada in the 1950s because her uncle, Constantin Klimoff, had come to Canada in 1948 to teach music at the Séminaire in Trois-Rivière. A year later he went to Laval, but also taught at the Ursuline convent, according to Mrs. B-T. He had been recommended by N. Medtner who was a friend of the family, as was Rachmaninoff. Mrs. B-T remembers Medtner.

She thinks her uncle had Medtner letters and will try to find out whether they survive. Her uncle had a brother in Montreal who apparently is still alive, a painter. He may have these letters. If so, she will make us a present.

The papers bought on 22 Oct. 1986 include 6 photos (one of which is a duplicate), 14 letters by Bruno Walter (dated 1893-1952), 4 by the choral conductor Bruno Kittel(dated 1926-1933), 1 postcard by Wilhelm Rode, a singer, one letter by Hans Freudenthal from Norway to Leo Schlesinger, the photocopy of one programme, a some typed press notices for a violinist called Endre Wolf, 1951.
