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## INTRODUCTION

### J 10 Series

Laurier House and Kingsmere, 1898-1961. Originals, 2.8m (volumes 1-28).

This Series relates to W.L.M. King's two residences: Laurier House in Ottawa and Kingsmere in the Quebec Gatineau Hills. Laurier House's previous owner was Sir Wilfrid Laurier and after his death in 1919, it was the property of Lady Laurier. At her death in 1921 the house was left to King, the man who had succeeded Laurier as the leader of the Liberal Party. King had the house extensively remodelled to serve as a semi-official residence. King lived here until his death in 1950. In his will King left the house to the people of Canada. Parks Canada now operates Laurier House as a museum.

The Laurier House subject files relate to its remodelling, interior decoration, furnishings, and maintenance. Also present are accounts, correspondence, notes, and catalogues related to the day-to-day running of the house. King entertained many famous Canadians and foreign dignitaries at the house. The invitations and dinner menus in the Hospitality Files record these famous visitors.

Kingsmere was King's rural summer retreat in the Gatineau Hills. He started acquiring property in this area in 1903 and over the next forty years he acquired 600 acres. In comparison to Laurier House which was a semi-official residence, Kingsmere was a private retreat which King jealously guarded from the outside world. This estate too was left to the people of Canada upon King's death in 1950. It now forms part of the National Capital Commission's Gatineau Park.

The Kingsmere files describe King's attempt to create a country estate in the Gatineau Hills. There is correspondence, invoices, notes, and catalogues about horticulture, gardens, flowers, and crops. King's attempts at keeping sheep and poultry are documented. There are files on property acquisition, and the reconstruction of the various cottages. The origin and erection of King's famous architectural antiques are also documented in this section. On a more prosaic level, there are also files on plumbing, maintenance, and equipment.

Maps, plans, architectural drawings, water colours, and photographs have been transferred to the appropriate divisions.

## INTRODUCTION

Maison Laurier et Kingsmere, 1898-1961. Originaux, 2,8m (volumes 1-28)

Cette série a rapport avec les deux résidences de W.L.M. King: la maison Laurier à Ottawa et Kingsmere dans les collines de la rivière Gatineau au Québec. Le premier propriétaire de la maison Laurier fut Sir Wilfrid Laurier qui la légua à son épouse, Lady Laurier, à sa mort en 1919. À la mort de cette dernière, la maison fut laissée à King qui avait succédé à Laurier à la tête du Parti libéral. King a fait modifier considérablement la maison pour en faire sa résidence semi-officielle. King y demeura jusqu'à sa mort en 1950. Il l'a léguée par testament au peuple du Canada. À partir de ce moment, Parcs Canada gère la maison Laurier comme un musée.

Les dossiers sujets de la Maison Laurier documentent ses transformations, sa décoration intérieure son ameublement et son entretien. On y retrouve également des livres de comptes, de la correspondance, des notes et des catalogues reliés à la marche quotidienne de la maison. King recevait plusieurs Canadiens célèbres et dignitaires étrangers à la maison. Les invitation et les menus que l'on retrouve dans les dossiers "Hospitality" documentent ces visites de célébrités.

Kingsmere était le refuge estival et rural de King dans les collines de la Gatineau. Il commença à acquérir des propriétés dans cette région en 1903 et durant les 40 années qui suivirent, il fit l'acquisition de 600 acres. Contrairement à la maison Laurier qui était une résidence semi-officielle, Kingsmere était un lieu privé de retraite que King protégeait jalousement du monde extérieur. Cette propriété fut également laissée au peuple du Canada à la mort de King, en 1950. Elle fait maintenant partie du Parc de la Gatineau de la Commission de la capitale nationale.

Les dossiers sujets de Kingsmere décrivent les efforts de King pour constituer un domaine campagnard dans les collines de la Gatineau. On y retrouve de la correspondance, des factures, des notes et des catalogues d'horticulture, de jardins, de fleurs et de cultures. Des documents témoignent des tentatives de King d'élever des moutons et de la volaille. Il y a des dossiers sur l'acquisition de propriétés et sur la reconstruction de différentes maisonnettes. Il y a aussi, dans cette section des documents sur les origines et l'érection des célèbres reconstitutions historiques et architecturales de King. À un niveau plus terre-à-terre, il y a aussi des dossiers sur la plomberie, l'entretien et l'équipement.

Des cartes, des plans, des dessins architecturaux, des aquarelles et des photographies ont été transférés aux divisions appropriées.
